Just recently, I had the pleasure of interviewing Keota High School's art teacher, Ms. Miller. You may have seen her standing in the student lounge, conversing with other teachers and greeting students as they pass. Ms. Mary Colleen Miller has worked at Keota High School since 1998, a proud teacher for 19 years. Ms. Miller explains that her job consists of a few roles. Those roles include working as a K-12 art teacher, our yearbook advisor, and a helpful prom sponsor. Ms. Miller graduated from EMC Harrisonburg, Virginia. She also went to JMU for many of her art classes and finished her schooling at Iowa Wesleyan in Mount Pleasant, Iowa so that she could become a teacher.

When questioned as to why Ms. Miller chose the teaching profession, she said that she enjoyed working with students and she loves teaching art, especially to the younger children. Her favorite part about teaching is that class always changes when new students come around, so they have new interests in projects. She and the students get to learn more about them as time goes on. She once thought she wanted to teach web design, but decided that it would come with too much pressure, so she tossed that idea. Ms. Miller said that if given the opportunity to change her profession, she would choose to still be a teacher. However, she is one of many staff members who does not enjoy the professional development aspect of teaching. She would change the way professional development is geared to all, making it more individual and dealing with specific subjects instead of a general, overall topic.

When inquired about what her favorite subject to teach was, Miller responded with, "That's really hard. Probably Art 1, because it touches on everything, though my favorite part is drawing and teaching

students to sketch in depth and showing them new techniques." Her system of student work evaluation consists of looking at the child's work ethic, time management, originality of the piece, use of materials, and the execution. Fortunately, Ms. Miller's art classes are for everyone, as students who may lack enthusiasm or struggle with core classes are welcome and usually find a home or safe zone in art classes. And don't be afraid of accidentally falling asleep in class. Ms. Miller understands that classes and homework can get tiring, so she will come over and wake you gently, but she will expect that it will not happen often.

the development of our school by embracing positivity and making sure that all students are succeeding. Students matter most in Mrs. Amelon's perspective.
