The junior high season is going a little rocky, with a runner out due to a fractured ankle. Nonetheless, things went well for Owen Morris at the meet on Oct. 5. Weeks stated, "Owen had a plan to follow and he went with that plan, so he felt good after that race."

On Sept. 10 the team competed at Colfax-Mingo. For the high school team, Noah Fisher ran a split of 10:23 and finished the race with a time of 32:17. Ryan Lawson ran a split of 7:39 and finished the race with a time of 23:47.

For the junior high team, Skyler Pringle ran a split of 6:58 and finished the race with a time of 13:57, placing him fifth overall. Owen Morris ran a split of 8:02 and finished with a time of 16:05. David Sherman ran a split of 9:02 and finished the race with a time of 18:04.

"This team is a great group of runners and they give you a lot to work with," Weeks said. "They are on track to peak at the right moment to get a conference medal, and the high school members have a good foundation to build off of for next season."

## COBRAS NAMED DISTRICT CHAMPS

The SK Cobras are off to a great start this season. They are undefeated after beating Mediapolis on Oct. 2, with a score of 31-14. The Cobras were named Class 1A District 6 Champions after beating the Bulldogs. A win against Cardinal will clinch an unbeaten regular season for SK. The Cobras' record is 6-0.

Brady Duwa had this to say about the Cobra's season: "Our goal is to go 1-0 every day by getting better every practice. We aren't worried about the long term. If we can build a little bit each day, this team will go far." Duwa is leading the team with 230 yards receiving. He also averages 40.2 yards per punt return, 42.6 per kick return, and has returned four kicks for touchdowns this season.

The Cobras opened the season on Aug. 28 defeating Mid-Prairie 27-21. Then on Sept. 4 they beat Union 48-14. The Cobra's defense shut-out Louisa-Muscatine and Pekin, scoring 41 points on the Falcons (Sept. 11) and 49 against the Panthers (Sept. 25). SK was also victorious on Sept. 18 against Van Buren, with a score of 48-13. The Cobras are averaging 40.66 points and 246 rushing yards per game.

Coach Klynt Weber commented, "This is our third season in our 4-2-5 defense. We returned seven players with significant defensive experience, and it has shown as our defense has smothered opponents, allowing just 9.1 points per game."

Sam Sieren leads the team with 754 yards rushing. SK has had 21 interceptions in the last 15 games. Jack Clarahan leads SK with 36 tackles. Bryce Greiner, defensive and quick tackle for the Cobras, said, "I feel like this team is so close. We come to play and want to win. That is why we have been so successful this year. We hope to make a deep playoff run, and we love the support from the community."

SK looks to have home-field advantage during the playoffs. Carson Sprouse, a center and nose guard, says he hopes the team makes it to the Dome in Cedar Falls. Good luck to the SK Cobras on the rest of the season.
