



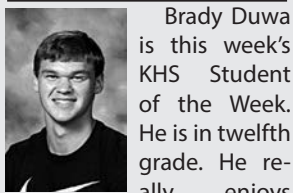

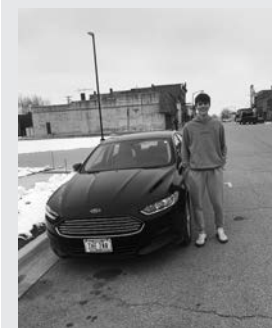

## Junior High and High School Wrestling

The SK wrestling team is off to a good start this season. Coach Trevor Weeks said this year has been a crazy year in wrestling, and in any sport, because of the Covid-19 virus.

There are two junior high wrestlers from Keota this year: Caden Clarahan (grade 8) and Owen Menke (grade 7). They had three meets before Christmas break at Lynnville-Sully, Davis County, and Oskaloosa. They finished off their season with a meet at Sigourney.

"They are both very good in their own ways," Mr. Weeks said of his two junior high wrestlers. "Owen is a guy that wanted to beat his opponents by more every time. He knows the ins and outs of wrestling in SE Iowa. Caden was a technician. He wanted to use more difficult moves. Sometimes it didn't work out

for him, but he was trying things. Both of these athletes would have no trouble competing against higher competition in the high school practice room. I would put these two against anyone in the state. That is how confident I feel!"

Weeks said the next step for the program would be to get the junior high wrestlers into the weight room. "We just need to get ourselves a little tougher, physically and mentally," he said.

Weeks said he is always trying to get a few more kids to go out for wrestling. He currently has some parents bringing over their elementary students to youth practices on Mondays and Thursdays at 6 p.m. "I have people in the community that are genuinely interested in what we do," Weeks said.

Hunter Sieren (freshman) is the lone Keota wrestler on the high school team. Coach

Weeks said he has been a great addition to the room this year. At the most recent JV tournament in Independence on Saturday, Jan. 16, Sieren got fourth place. Weeks commented, "Come sophomore, junior and senior years, he will be really good. He wrestles with a lot of talented kids in the room and he is very coachable."

Overall, this season has seen a growth in numbers in the program, with 18 high school wrestlers this year compared to only eight last year. "That gives SK a lot more competition in the room," Weeks said.

On Friday, Jan. 8, the high school team had a dual meet at Sigourney against North Mahaska and Iowa Valley, and even though they ended up losing to Iowa Valley, it came down to the last match.

Some of the big dual meets coming up are on Monday, Jan. 25 at Sigourney against

long time rival Pekin, and on Saturday, Feb. 6 they have a sectional meet in Sigourney.

Fan favorite Jack Clarahan (Sigourney sophomore) is coming into the season with good form, and whatever meet he goes to he always puts on a good show, Weeks said. Heavyweight Zach Smithhart (Sigourney junior) has only been wrestling for a month, but he is a tough addition to the room and he even wrestled a returning state champ runner up for girls. Zach also wrestled the rank 10 guy from North Mahaska. Another new wrestler to the room is Cade Molyneux (Sigourney junior) who Coach Weeks says is the toughest athlete he has seen in this area.

"We have a lot of tough guys who love to compete and support the SK wrestling program and each other," Weeks said. "It will be exciting to see how the program continues to improve in the next few years."
