



Keota High School's new foreign exchange student, Eduard Bogdan Serban, is a 17 year-old from Romania. Edy, as he likes to be called, is a junior in high school. When asked why he wanted to be a foreign exchange student, Eddie said he wanted to learn about American culture and about the educational system.He lives with his mom and brother back in Romania, but he is currently living with his host parent, Dean Greiner. He enjoys living there because he has never lived on a farm.

Though he's never lived on a farm, he has had pets and currently change and Study Abroad, National Security Language Initiative for Youth, Congress-Bundestag Youth Exchange, Youth Leadership Program, or Youth Ambassadors Program. Specifically, current or past participants in these programs are not eligible to participate if the two programs will take place in the same calendar year or if the individual is currently participating, or has already participated, in an academic year program.

Edy had to sign up for the program during October of last year and he had to take an online English test, as well as meet with an American official for an interview.

Edy has noticed a few differences in our school, along with differences between our countries. One of these differences is that in his home country the teachers actually change classes instead of the students. Another is that noone in Romanian schools get school lunches. Instead, if they wish to eat they must bring lunch to school. The students are also not allowed

Like in America though, some Romanian schools do have uniforms. He states as well that in Romania, people are far less "judgy." In Romania they apparently don't have any sports. Also in Romania, everyone is required to take the Chorus class. The grading system is from 1 to 10, with a 10 being equivalent to an "A" here.

Romania is a democratic state. The President acts as international communications and the Prime Minister is in charge of in-country issues. Both are elected. Many people in Romania live in what Edy calls ranches: three bedrooms, a living room, and two bathrooms. In general, Romania is very unique from America.

Keota High School would like to welcome Edy to our school and community. We wish him the best this school year.
